Rels 8210 Religious Sounds Map Project

This unit is comprised of two parts. To be successful with both, you should keep both in mind as you work.

Part 1: Collecting Publicly Available Sound (75%)

Your task is to record a publicly available sound in metropolitan Atlanta for the Religious Sounds Map Project. The goal of this Project, in its simplest terms, is to begin answering the question, "What does religious ritual sound like in Atlanta?" The sound that you ultimately post need not be terribly complex or long (2.5-4 minutes), but it should capture a moment that speaks to this question. The specifics of this part of the assignment are as follows:

- Before you begin, please go to ATLMaps (https://atlmaps.com; click on "Religious Sounds") to familiarize yourself with previous images, sound clips, and interviews. Note that this map is in process, so not every "pin" has all the information uploaded yet.
- In many cases, you will need to reach out to key people to ask permission if you may record sound. It would not be a good idea to simply show up and ask permission on the spot. Instead, you should call or write an email describing who you are, what you are working on, and what you would like to do. You may ask to record something very specific (a choir rehearsal) or you may ask your subject what kinds of compelling sounds they may suggest. Events that are occurring spontaneously in public are certainly possibilities, but we are on a tight schedule, and those kinds of events are impossible to schedule.
- After you select a recording site/event, you should do some preliminary research to learn what you can about its community and practices. If your site/event has a website or Facebook page, familiarize yourself with it. If it is associated with a broader tradition, read up on it. If there are social media forums where people discuss your site, visit them.
- You should reserve and become familiar with the technology you need. Either reserve a recording "bag" in the department or reserve a digital audio recorder via the library. Instructions for how to use the digital auto recorder can be found online at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xP9AKt5JBcI. A hard copy of the instruction manual can also be found within the digital recorder bag. Let me or my GRA know if you would like help learning to use the technology. Before you visit your site/event, make sure you have extra batteries and headphones on hand, that you understand how the recorder works, and that you know and have a plan for submitting and storing a back-up of your final digital files.

- You should record a sound that is occurring without your direct intervention. In other words, do not plan to "stage" a sound. Your job is to observe and capture what would have been already occurring. Don't worry about filtering ambient "noise"; these are part of the event
- You must provide metadata to the Religious Sounds Map Project (see form below). You should review the form carefully before you visit the site/event to capture sound so you know what kinds of information to collect. You will receive specific instructions about submitting your sound files.

You recorded and submitted an appropriate, high-quality interview (2.5-4 minutes) that explains the recorded religious sound(s) that will be useful as an element of the Religious Sound Maps Project (25%)

You submitted the required, completed consent form(s) (10%).

You submitted 2 appropriate, high-quality photo images of the site/event that will be useful as elements of the Religious Sounds Map Project (15%).
